LATEST SELFLESS SERVICE RECIPIENT LEFT A LIFELONG IMPACT ON THE COMMUNITY

akdale Electric Cooperative [OEC] believes in the power of individuals stepping forward and using their talents for the benefit of others. In an effort to thank these outstanding individuals for their selfless service to their community, the co-op is recognizing one nominated individual quarterly for his or her volunteer work with a Selfless Service Award.

Mark Chew had only been in the Warrens area since 2019 but made a large impact on the community. His restaurant, Marco's Italian and American Grill, is a staple in the Warrens area. Mark not only treated his patrons like family but the entire surrounding communities as well. Mark sponsored the Annual Tree Lighting Festival in Warrens, and invited the community to bring ornaments



to decorate the tree while offering a free community meal afterwards.

When the Warrens Cranberry Festival was canceled in 2020, he was instrumental in organizing a golf fundraising event that raised over \$20,000 for the Town of Lincoln Fire Department. Close friend Linda Pierce stated, "If it weren't for Mark, those organizations may not have raised adequate funding in 2020. Mark took it upon himself to do something." A fundraiser that was orchestrated quickly from one man with love for his community is going on its third year as an annual event.

Mark had a heart that just kept giving. He held a multitude of fundraising events for the local animal shelter and supported youth and local organizations in the area, including Chasing Daylight Animal Shelter, Town of Lincoln Fire Department, Warrens Trail Twisters, Youth Wrestling, and more. Pierce stated, "When Mark saw a need for help, he stepped up and did his part, no questions asked."

Linda and Kevin Pierce have been friends with Mark and his wife, Lan (Cindy) Chew, since day one. Kevin stated, "I noticed someone new bought the place and looked like it was open for business. I stopped in and Mark said they weren't open yet but served me a drink anyway. From there on, it's been known that I was his first customer."

A man that may not have been in the area for long, left a lifelong impact on the community. Mark sadly passed away in December and is survived by his wife, Lan (Cindy) Chew, and children in Iowa and Pennsylvania. "His impact on the community will never be forgotten," stated Linda Pierce.

NOMINATE A SELFLESS SERVICE AWARD NOMINEE FOR A CHANCE AT \$20!

o you know someone committed to the community and always available to lend a helping hand? Nominate them for the Oakdale Electric Cooperative's Selfless Service Award for a chance at a \$20 bill credit.

The Selfless Service Award Nomination Contest will be a reoccurring contest for each quarter. To be eligible, you must be an Oakdale Electric Cooperative (OEC) member with an active account number; nominees do not have to be an OEC member. Once the award recipient is selected, the OEC member nominator of the awarded recipient will be notified and receive a \$20 bill credit.

Nominations for quarter one must be submitted by 4 p.m. on March 15, 2022.

What is the Selfless **Service Award?**

This award is presented to individuals who engage in community volunteerism, performing valuable services that benefit and improve quality of life within the communities served by OEC. The award, a \$250 gift card and plague, will be presented to one individual in the months of January, April, July, and October.

Awards will not be granted, for example, to:

- An individual in a paid position with a nonprofit organization
- · A volunteer who assists another individual (i.e., lawn mowing, snow shoveling, etc.)
- Self-nominations

Lineworker

One \$1,000 scholarship will be awarded to a high school senior pursuing a post-secondary education in an electrical lineworker program. Any applicant enrolling in a lineworker program is eligible. Preference will be given to Oakdale Electric Cooperative members, and residents of Monroe, Juneau, Jackson, Sauk, and Wood counties.

At-Large/Non-Traditional

One \$1,000 scholarship will be awarded to a high school senior who is not enrolled in one of the 12 participating public high schools in our

service area (At-Large) or someone pursuing post-secondary education after spending time in the work place or raising a family (Non-Traditional).

To be eligible, the applicant must be a member or the son or daughter (or under the legal guardianship) of an active member of Oakdale Electric Cooperative in good standing and accepted at a postsecondary program or accredited training

Applications for the Lineworker and At-Large/Non-Traditional scholarships are due by May 1, 2022.
