

- Biography Answer a few questions to help members get to know you and decide who they should vote for.
- Speech Give a short 1-2 minute speech at the annual meeting on March 21 before voting.

- Training: Credited Cooperative Director

eneral Manager Bruce Ardelt announced earlier this year his plan to retire in January 2020 to the board of directors. He served as the fourth general manager in the 85-year history of Oakdale Electric Cooperative (OEC).

Ardelt began his cooperative career at Adams-Columbia Electric Cooperative, Friendship, in 1980. Ten years later, he was hired to serve as the manager of finance and administration for Oakdale Electric Cooperative. Ardelt was promoted to the position of general manager in 2000.

Recalling New Year's Eve in his new position brought back a laugh. "My first duty as general manager was handling the potential Y2K glitches. We stationed ourselves at the co-op nervously awaiting the new millennium. My phone rang on the midnight hour; however, the call was from my card club teasing us to see if the co-op was still standing," laughed Ardelt when he shared this memory.

Ardelt worked long and hard ahead of time to ensure a smooth transition that New Year, and every year following. Being mission-driven and always member-focused were keys to his success.

Over the course of his career at OEC, Ardelt oversaw several significant improvements to the operation of the

cooperative, including construction of a new facility, deployment of improved technology, and development of renewable energy. He served on the boards of numerous non-profit organizations including the Electric Utility State Apprenticeship Advisory Committee, Federated Youth Foundation, Oakdale Credit Union, Wisconsin Electric Cooperative Association, and Workforce Connections. Ardelt, highly regarded

in the cooperative industry, offered his expertise to both state and national level organizations. He served as an officer for the Wisconsin and Dairyland Managers Associations, and held positions through the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association as a member on the Cooperative Management, Employment, and Community Committee.

An active and engaged member of his rural Tomah community, Ardelt raised two children, Jon and Katie, alongside his wife of 40 years, Kim. Coaching youth sports and volunteering for the Tomah Lions Club were high priorities following his cooperative work commitments. Ardelt was elected onto the board for Hiawatha Golf Club, and assisted Forward Tomah with community development.

Under Ardelt's leadership, Oakdale Electric Cooperative

continued to thrive while preserving the cooperative way. Most notably, membership numbers soared to current numbers of 18,000 and assets tripled in value. Ardelt expressed that Oakdale Electric Cooperative's great success is a direct reflection on the cooperative efforts from all employees and directors.

Bruce remarked on his time spent at Oakdale, "I have met and worked with a lot of great people over the years. It has been an honor and privilege to work for such a great co-op. It's the employees, directors, and friends I will miss the most. I feel very fortunate to have worked in the electric cooperative family for 40 years. Thank you for your support and for the trust and confidence you place in Oakdale Electric as your electric provider."
